Parc House boarders are not permitted to have any electronic devices in their rooms on school nights (Sunday – Thursday), but our Year 9 and 10 students are

permitted to have them overnight on Friday and Saturday provided that their academic reports are excellent.

I would like to suggest again that all parents (Parc House parents in particular) investigate using Screentime (iOS) / Family Link (Android) to support us in managing what your child can access and for how long.



A good number of day and boarding parents (including Mrs Dorrington and I) do use this feature and it compliments the safeguards that we have in place like restricted device time and Wi-Fi filtering to protect your child from inappropriate content.

Snooker There was some interest in the recent Snooker World

After-school activities run on Monday's, Wednesday's and Thursday and these are supervised by teaching staff across the school.

During the summer term, we try and get students outdoors as much as possible and tennis and volleyball in particular are well attended.

Debate club has proved popular this year and boarders and day students from Year 7-10 take part. Topics debated this term have included 'should we have the death penalty?'; 'should books be rewritten to reflect today's society?', and 'should we test on animals?'. Mrs Luckman (English) randomly assigns students to opposing camps and they learn valuable skills in attempting to argue a case that they may not agree with.



Rewards and Sanctions

are used at St. Mike's to highlight those students that do well and support those who find aspects of school life more challenging.

All of you as parents will have received emails from the school when you child receives a merit (House Point) for excellent work; scoring highly in a test; taking part in a house or sporting competition etc. Each merit carries a +1 score and some of our younger boarders are approaching 200 points which are regularly totalled and added to the House Points total (Merlin or Caradoc Houses).

Merit badges are awarded in assemblies for those that reach 50 (Bronze), 100 (Silver), and 150 (Gold) merits.



Academic effort, performance and behaviour across the school is generally excellent. but consequences are issued to those students who fail to submit homework on time or behave in that we don't expect. Consequence 1 (C1) is a warning recorded by teachers, and I am notified along with their Pastoral Leader (Head of Year). Generally, these don't warrant any further action recognise as we

homework is forgotten occasionally for example. If however I see a pattern emerging, I may have a conversation with the student concerned and may contact home for additional support.

A Consequence 2 (C2) is issued if a second homework is missed during a term or classroom behaviour is disrupting the learning of others and a warning has been issued. These are much rarer in boarding and will almost certainly warrant conversation with the house parent on duty and as parents, you are notified by email when the teacher records the incident. A written piece of reflective work must be completed and submitted to the teacher the day after a C2 is issued.

There are Consequence 3, 4 and 5's for more serious behaviour incidents, but these are very rarely used and would involve the Pastoral Leader, Mrs Francis, and Mr Ferrari respectively.

It is worth highlighting here that across the senior school (320+ students), over 21,000 merit points have been issued this academic year.

Special mentions here go to Inas, Lennox, Precious and Esther who are approaching or have passed 150 merits this year (Gold) ②.
